

<b>Martinique</b> <i>Customs Information</i>	
<b>Customs Regulations</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Shipments of household goods and personal effects can be imported duty free provided the shipper has owned and used the goods for at least twelve (12) months prior to the relocation if the shipment is coming from a non-EU country.</li> </ul>
<b>Documents Required</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Detailed inventory in French, signed by the shipper</li> <li>✓ Certificate of Change of Residence from French consulate</li> <li>✓ Non Resale Attestation Form signed by the shipper</li> </ul> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ The Change of Residence Certificate is obtained by the shipper (relocate) when he/she collects his/her visa from the French consulate. The Certificate should state that the shipper has been a resident outside the EU for longer than 12 months before the transfer.</li> <li>▪ A non-resale attestation form can also be obtained from the French consulate. The form is in French, and will need to be signed by the shipper. This form states that the goods being imported are for the personal use of the shipper and not for resale.</li> <li>▪ If the shipper is being transferred for job related reasons, the Customs Office will usually accept an attestation of transfer from the shipper's employer, which should state that the individual is being transferred for employment reasons and that he has not been a resident in the EU during the prior 12 months. Also, his certificate of transfer will replace his change of residence documentation.</li> </ul>
<b>Motor Vehicles</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Vehicles can be imported duty free provided they have been owned and used by the shipper for at least six months prior to importation.</li> <li>▪ The owner must have been living abroad for at least one year.</li> <li>▪ The shipper should have available:               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ original document of title</li> <li>✓ certificate of change of residence</li> <li>✓ past registration</li> <li>✓ past insurance cards</li> <li>✓ sale invoice</li> <li>✓ non-resale form signed by the importer</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
<b>Liquor</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Shippers can import small and reasonable amounts of liquor (up to fifty bottles) as part of a household good shipment.</li> <li>➤ Duty and tax will be applied on all liquor.</li> </ul>
<b>Firearms</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ <i>Heavily restricted item:</i> Shipper will need to obtain prior approval from the French Ministry of Defense to import firearms. (Import permit issued by Directorate General of Customs, bureau D 3.)</li> </ul>
<b>Pets</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ All pets must have a certificate of health from a veterinarian indicating that the pet is free from rabies, and has lived in the origin country for at least six months.</li> <li>➤ This certificate must be dated no less than three days prior to departure.</li> <li>➤ Alternately, the shipper can have a new rabies inoculation certificated dated between one and six months of departure</li> </ul>
<b>Prohibited Goods</b>	<p>Some prohibited goods include, but are not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Live plants</li> <li>➤ Ivory</li> <li>➤ Drugs</li> <li>➤ Ammunition</li> </ul>
<b>Dutiable / Restricted Items</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ New items</li> <li>➤ Jewelry and precious metals</li> <li>➤ Antiques and art objects</li> </ul>
